TABLE OF EXEMPTIONS.

i.—All goods imported for the Government of Cyprus to be used in the public service and duly certified as so imported by the Chief Secretary to Government.

ii.—All Military Stores imported by Her Majesty's War Department and duly certified as such by the Officer to whom they are consigned.

iii.—All goods imported for the use of the High Commissioner and duly certified by the High Commissioner to be so imported, and if any article or thing on which duty has been paid at the time of importation be subsequently supplied for the use of the High Commissioner, the amount of the duty on the article or thing so supplied shall be repaid out of the Treasury on the order of the High Commissioner.

iv.—All articles of Military equipment imported by and for the use of any Officer of Her Majesty's land forces.

(a) An additional duty of 4½ c.p. per oke, or fraction of an oke, is charged if imported through the Parcels Post.

(b) If otherwise imported there is an additional duty of 1s. per oke, or fraction of an oke, when in packages of less than 20 okes.

IMPORT DUTY. TABLE OF EXEMPTIONS—*continued.*

AUTHORITY.

v.—Goods and Stores of every description supplied under contract with Her Majesty's War Department for the public use of Her Majesty's land forces, duly certified as such by the principal Commissariat Officer, such certificate to be countersigned by the Chief Secretary to Government.

Law No. 22 of 1899.

vi.—Uniforms of Public Officers and professional robes of Legal or Judicial Officers in the employment of Her Majesty's Government, provided that such uniforms or robes are introduced for the personal use only of such officers, and have been duly authorized.

vii.—Professional robes of Advocates entitled to practise in Cyprus.

viii.—Authorized uniforms of Foreign Consuls and Consular Officers and national flags imported for their use.

Authorized uniforms of any Foreign Government to be worn by persons entitled to wear them.

Government medals and decorations to be worn by persons resident in Cyprus.

ix.—Fire-arms for the personal use of Officers of Her Majesty's Naval and Military Forces.

x.—Paving stones imported by Municipal Councils in the Island to be used for the paving of streets within the Municipal limits, and duly certified as so imported by the President and Cashier of any Municipal Council.

xi.—Street lamps and their fittings imported by Municipal Councils in the Island to be used in the lighting of Streets within the Municipal limits, and duly certified as so imported by the President and the Cashier of any Municipal Council.

xii.—Casks and vats, and staves and hoops for use in constructing casks and vats.

xiii.—Microscopes and all microscopical and other apparatus or appliances for purposes of scientific investigation and research.

xiv.—Gymnastic apparatus, mathematical and generally all other instruments used in schools for educational purposes, which are imported for the use of schools.

xv.—Animals and livestock, atlases and maps, anchors and chains (ships'), bark, boats, charcoal, church furniture, and articles intended to be used in the building and fitting up of churches and mosques and vestments and other articles necessarily used for religious services and certified to be so intended or used, as the case may be, by the proper ecclesiastical authority, coals, empty casks and sacks, fresh fish, gold bullion and specie, ice, lime, medicines and medical appliances, pitch and tar, printed books, sawdust, silk-worms' eggs, sponges taken by licensed boats, stationery, printing paper, whether white or coloured, printing ink, printers' type, and printing materials, sulphur, wheat, barley, oats, vetches, flour, bran, chopped straw, cotton seed, fodder for cattle, and all mechanical appliances for use in manufacture and examination of wine; sulphur syringes, tombstones and memorial tablets, and tools and implements used in Agriculture and Handicrafts.

xvi.—Machinery and parts of machinery and their fittings, connections and gearing.

The High Commissioner may in certain cases order admission free of duty of goods sent for use in Consular Offices (Sec. 11 of Law XXII. of 1899).

Dutiable articles that have previously been exported from Cyprus, provided they are re-imported not later than one year after exportation.

Hospital appliances or equipment, certified under the hand of the Chief Medical Officer to be imported for the use of any Hospital.

DRAWBACK OF IMPORT DUTY.

Persons who pay import duty on guns brought with them to Cyprus for sporting purposes are entitled to have three-fourths of the amount refunded at the Custom House, Larnaca, in the event of their taking the guns out of the Island within 5 years on production of the documents referred to in Sec. 2 (a) and (b) of Order in Council No. 19, *Gazette* 77 of 19th October, 1881.

When any Import Duty shall have been paid in respect of any wine, spirits, malt liquors, tobacco, cigars, or articles of food supplied for the use of any mess on board any of Her Majesty's ships of war, a drawback of the amount of the duty so paid may be allowed, or if such goods are shipped from the Customs store before payment of duty, the amount of such duty may be remitted on the production of a certificate from the proper officer of Customs that such goods have been actually shipped on board one of Her Majesty's ships, a receipt from the Paymaster of such ship for the goods and a written undertaking from the Paymaster or other proper officer of such ship that if such goods or any part thereof shall be at any time re-landed, the duty shall be paid thereon.

VII.

PUBLIC DEBT.

PUBLIC DEBT.

Under an Annex to the Convention of 4th June, 1878, between Great Britain and Turkey the former Power has undertaken to pay to the Porte annually a sum representing the excess of Revenue over Expenditure calculated on the average of the five years preceding the date of the Convention, excluding the produce of State and Crown lands let or sold during that period. The amount to be paid has been determined to be £87,686 per annum ; this to be in addition to 4,166,220 okes of Salt to be paid in kind.

The sum of £113 11s. 3d. per annum has also become payable, under the same Annex, since the 4th September, 1884, when the Cyprus Government took over the administration of the Lighthouse Service in the Island. This sum represents 22% of the receipts of the Ottoman Lighthouse Administration which the Sublime Porte enjoyed under the concession granted the Company for lighting the Coast of Cyprus.

By a further Agreement of 3rd February, 1879, a further sum of £5,000 is to be paid annually to the Porte in respect of the produce of State lands.

A sum of £60,000 provided for by a loan has been expended on Irrigation, and £2,400 by way of interest and Sinking Fund is provided in the annual Estimates. On 31st March, 1907, £57,544 was outstanding.

Further loans to the amount of £254,000 have been obtained on account of the Famagusta Harbour and Railway and £10,757 by way of Interest and Sinking Fund was provided in the annual Estimates. A further sum of £2,500 is contributed from the Locust Fund as its share of debt charges. On 31st March, 1907, £246,520 was outstanding.

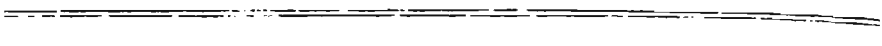

The Maronites are under the authority of an Archbishop residing in Syria ; the Roman Catholics and Armenian Catholics under the Latin Patriarch of Jerusalem.

The Sisters of the French Order of St. Joseph of the Apparition have a Convent, School, and dispensary at Larnaca, and Convents and Schools at Nicosia and at Limassol.

The Monks of the Franciscan Order have a Monastery, two Churches and a School at Larnaca, and Monasteries with Schools attached at Nicosia and Limassol. They depend on the " Custodia " of Terra Santa.

The Maronites have eight Churches and four Monasteries in the Island.

The Armenians have a Church at Nicosia, and a Monastery and Chapel in the Kyrenia District.

There are two Church of England Churches, those of St. Paul at Nicosia and St. Helen at Larnaca. There is also a dedicated Church Room at Famagusta.

Taking an average of the number of prisoners employed on Public Works and valuing their labour at 4½cp. per man per diem, the value of the services of the convicts during the year may be put at £704 4s. 0cp. The estimated value of the labour of prisoners employed on industrial work (shoe-making, tailoring, weaving, dyeing, carpentering, brush-making, stocking making and baking) is £1,017 8s. 0cp.

The amount derived from the sale of broken stone to Municipalities, etc., and paid into the Treasury was £38 2s. 5cp.

Each prisoner sleeps in a separate cell in the Central Prison.

One warder is stationed in each corridor or (in the Central Prison) Block.

In the District Prisons no religious services are held. The Greek-Christians confess and receive the sacrament on their chief religious festivals. In the Central Prison a service for Moslems is held on Fridays and on alternate Sundays a Priest or Layman attends and ministers to the members of the Greek Church. The attendance of the Hodja has been regular but that of the Priest and Layman very irregular. A Religious and General Instructor (in addition to the Priest or Layman) appointed from 6th May, 1905, for Greek.

In Central Prison 3 classes of 1 hour each are held weekly; in District Prisons there are no schools, but well-conducted prisoners who can read are allowed to have religious books of their respective persuasions.

Prisoners of good behaviour and industrious in labour, sentenced to not less than two years are, if males, after three-fourths, or, if females, after two-thirds of their term of imprisonment has expired, recommended to the High Commissioner for remission of their sentence, with, or without, Ticket of Leave.

The District Medical Officer certifies as to the cause of death. Yes. Inquest held in Central Prison by the Commissioner of Nicosia (Coroner) on Convict No. 129, on 13th September, 1906. Verdict:—Natural causes.
