IMPORT DUTY. TABLE OF EXEMPTIONS.

i.—All goods imported for the Government of Cyprus to be used in the public service and duly certified as so imported by the Chief Secretary to Government. Law No. 22 of 1899.

ii.—All Military Stores imported by His Majesty's War Department and duly certified as such by the Officer to whom they are consigned.

iii.—All articles of Military equipment imported by and for the use of any Officer of His Majesty's land forces.

iv.—Goods and Stores of every description supplied under contract with His Majesty's War Department for the public use of His Majesty's land forces, duly certified as such by the principal Commissariat Officer, such certificate to be countersigned by the Chief Secretary to Government.

v.—Uniforms of Public Officers and professional robes of Legal or Judicial Officers in the employment of His Majesty's Government, provided that such uniforms or robes are introduced for the personal use only of such officers, and have been duly authorised.

vi.—Professional robes of Advocates entitled to practise in Cyprus.

vii.—Authorised uniforms of Foreign Consuls and Consular Officers and national flags imported for their use.

Authorised uniforms of any Foreign Government to be worn by persons entitled to wear them.
Government medals and decorations to be worn by persons resident in Cyprus.

viii.—Fire-arms for the personal use of Officers of His Majesty's Naval and Military Forces.

ix.—Paving stones imported by Municipal Councils in the Island to be used for the paving of streets within the Municipal limits, and duly certified as so imported by the President and Cashier of any Municipal Council.

x.—Street lamps and their fittings imported by Municipal Councils in the Island to be used in the lighting of Streets within the Municipal limits, and duly certified as so imported by the President and the Cashier of any Municipal Council.

xi.—Casks and vats, and staves and hoops for use in constructing casks and vats.

xii.—Microscopes and all microscopical and other apparatus or appliances for purposes of scientific investigation and research.

xiii.—Gymnastic apparatus, mathematical and generally all other instruments used in schools for educational purposes, which are imported for the use of schools.

AUTHORITY.

xiv.—Animals and livestock, atlases and maps, anchors and chains (ships'), bark, boats, charcoal, church furniture, and articles intended to be used in the building and fitting up of churches and mosques, and vestments and other articles necessarily used for religious services and certified to be so intended or used, as the case may be, by the proper ecclesiastical authority, coals, empty casks and sacks, fresh fish, gold bullion and specie, ice, lime, medicines and medical appliances, pitch and tar, printed books, sawdust, silk-worms' eggs, sponges taken by licensed boats, stationery, printing paper, whether white or coloured, printing ink, printers' type, and printing materials, sulphur, wheat, barley, oats, vetches, flour, bran, chopped straw, cotton seed, fodder for cattle, and all mechanical appliances for use in manufacture and examination of wine; sulphur syringes, tombstones and memorial tablets, and tools and implements used in Agriculture and Handicrafts.

xv.—Machinery and parts of Machinery and their fittings, connections and gearing.

The High Commissioner may in certain cases order admission free of duty of goods sent for use in Consular Offices (Sec. 11 of Law XXII. of 1899).

Dutiable articles and articles sent away for the purpose of alteration or repair provided: (1) that prior to exportation such articles shall have been produced to the Customs for the purpose of identification on re-importation, (2) or that the Chief Collector of Customs is satisfied that the articles are the same, (3) and that the re-importation takes place within one year from the date of exportation.

Iron piping, which the High Commissioner is satisfied is for work of Public utility and imported by any public Municipal body or authority.

IMPORT DUTY. DRAWBACK OF IMPORT DUTY.

When any Import Duty shall have been paid in respect of any wine, spirits, malt liquors, tobacco, cigars, or articles of food supplied for the use of any mess on board any of His Majesty's ships of war, a drawback of the amount of the duty so paid may be allowed, or if such goods are shipped from the Customs store before payment of duty, the amount of such duty may be remitted on the production of a certificate from the proper officer of Customs that such goods have been actually shipped on board one of His Majesty's ships, a receipt from the Paymaster of such ship for the goods and a written undertaking from the Paymaster or other proper officer of such ship that if such goods or any part thereof shall be at any time re-landed, the duty shall be paid thereon.

In lieu of drawback of import duty paid in respect of any wine, spirits, malt liquors, tobacco, cigars or articles of food imported and subsequently actually consumed or used by His Majesty's Land Forces, fixed money allowances are paid out of the Island Treasury to the Officers and Soldiers of His Majesty's Land Forces quartered within the Island.

All such Royalties shall be assessed and collected by the Customs Authorities at the Port of shipment. The Customs Authorities are hereby empowered in the event of the value of any mineral being in their opinion insufficiently or incorrectly declared to demand and take in respect of the said mineral the above Royalty or any part thereof in kind instead of in cash.

PROHIBITIONS AND RESTRICTIONS ON IMPORTS AND EXPORTS.

AUTHORITY.

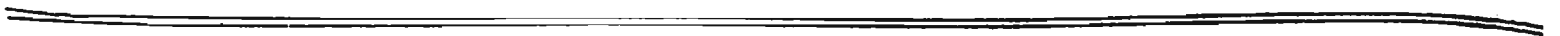

PUBLIC DEBT.

Under an Annex to the Convention of 4th June, 1878, between Great Britain and Turkey the former Power has undertaken to pay to the Porte annually a sum representing the excess of Revenue over Expenditure calculated on the average of the five years preceding the date of the Convention, excluding the produce of State and Crown lands let or sold during that period. The amount to be paid has been determined to be £37,686 per annum; this to be in addition to 4,166,220 okes of Salt to be paid in kind.

The sum of £113. 11s. 3d. per annum has also become payable, under the same Annex, since the 4th September, 1884, when the Cyprus Government took over the administration of the Lighthouse Service in the Island. This sum represents 22% of the receipts of the Ottoman Lighthouse Administration which the Sublime Porte enjoyed under the concession granted the Company for lighting the Coast of Cyprus.

By a further Agreement of 3rd February, 1879, a further sum of £5,000 is to be paid annually to the Porte in respect of the produce of State lands.

A sum of £60,000 provided for by a loan has been expended on Irrigation, and £2,400 by way of Interest and Sinking Fund is provided in the annual Estimates. On 31st March, 1920, £47,023. 8s. 6d. was outstanding.

Further loans to the amount of £254,000 were obtained on account of the Famagusta Harbour and Railway, and £8,612 by way of Interest and Sinking Fund was provided in the annual Estimates, of which sum £8,610. 14s. was expended, as a further sum of £2,500 was contributed from the Locust Fund as its share of debt charges. On 31st March, 1920, £180,480 was outstanding.

The Maronites are under the authority of an Archbishop residing in Syria; the Roman Catholics and Armeni Catholics under the Latin Patriarch of Jerusalem.

The Sisters of the French Order of St. Joseph of the Apparition have a Convent, School, and dispensary at Larnaca and Convents and Schools at Nicosia and at Limassol.

The Friars of the Franciscan Order have a Convent two Churches and a School at Larnaca, and Convent with School attached at Nicosia and Limassol. They depend on the "Custodia" of Terra Santa.

The Maronites have eight Churches and four Monasteries in the Island.

The Armenians have a Church, Surp Asdvadzadzin with schools attached, at Nicosia, and a Monastery, Surp Mag with a Chapel and School attached in the Kyrenia District, and a Chapel in the Larnaca District.

There are three Anglican Churches, those of St. Paul at Nicosia, St. Helen at Larnaca, and one at Limassol. There are dedicated Church Rooms at Famagusta, Kyrenia, and Troödos.

All short sentence prisoners from the neighbouring country are detained in these Prisons and are employed in the Forest Gardens and plantations there.

On 10th February, 1920, a Prison was established at Dikellia in the building known as "Dikellia Quarantine Station." Convicts from Paphos, Limassol and Famagusta Districts whose sentences are 6 months and under 2 years are drafted to this Prison. They are employed in re-forestation under the Forest Department.

Taking an average of the number of prisoners employed on public works and valuing their labour at 4½cp. per man per diem for stone-breaking and 6cp. for other work, the value of the services of the convicts during the year may be put at £1,800 17s. 0cp. The estimated value of the labour of prisoners employed on industrial work (shoe-making, tailoring, weaving, carpentering, brush-making, stocking-making, and baking) is £2,322 6s. 0cp.

517 cubic yards of broken stone were supplied to the Public Works Department for which no payment was received.

XII. What are the number of the hours allotted for sleep ? And, if sleep is in association, are the dormitories lighted ; and how often are they patrolled during the night ?

In winter 10 hours, in summer 8 hours. Sleep is in association in the District Prisons. The passages, corridors, and wards are well lighted. They are constantly patrolled during the night, and are visited frequently and at uncertain hours by the Governor of the Prison.

There are no Chaplains attached to the prisons. Priests of all denominations are admitted at the request of the prisoners.

In the District Prisons no religious services are held, except at Paphos and Larnaca for Greek-Christians. The Greek-Christians confess and receive the sacrament on their chief religious festivals. In the Central Prison a service for Moslems is held on Fridays and on alternate Sundays a priest or layman attends and ministers to the members of the Greek Church. The attendance of the hodja has been regular and that of the priest and layman has been more frequent this year, viz. : on 18 occasions. A religious and general instructor (in addition to the priest or layman) appointed from 6th May, 1906, for Greek ; also for Moslem. Attendance of Moslem and Greek teachers to school classes and for religious instruction has been regular. The Roman Catholic priest attended 5 times during the year.

XV. Are religious services regularly, or otherwise, performed for the benefit of the prisoners of any, and, if any, what, religious persuasion ?

Access is allowed to priests of all denominations. They are not apprised when prisoners are admitted, but notice would be given if prisoners expressed a wish to see them.

FOREIGN.

Parcels may be forwarded to, and received from, all countries which have adopted the Parcel Post System, at various rates.

Direct Parcel Post exchanges are maintained between Cyprus and England, Cyprus and Egypt, and Cyprus and France.

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

DIMENSIONS AND WEIGHT.

1. No parcel shall be conveyed by Parcel Post the dimensions of which shall exceed in length three feet six inches or exceed six feet in length and girth combined, or which shall exceed in weight eleven pounds.

FORBIDDEN, PERISHABLE, AND DANGEROUS ARTICLES.

2. It shall be prohibited to forward parcels which bear on the outside any writing or drawing of an indecent or offensive nature or within which any contents of a like nature may be observed, and parcels containing gunpowder, cartridges, oil-skins or other similar oiled goods, oiled paper, lucifer matches, or anything explosive or liable to sudden combustion, bladders containing liquid, live animals, live or dead insects except live bees enclosed in special receptacles, grossly offensive or filthy matter, and anything in a condition likely to injure other parcels or any Officer of the Post Office.

GENERAL REGULATIONS—*continued*.

AUTHORITY.

3. Parcels containing fish, game, meat, fresh fruit, sweetmeats, eggs, etc., or razors, scissors, needles, knives, forks, or other sharp instruments will not be accepted unless securely packed so as to guard against risk or injury to other parcels. Liquids or semi-liquids, such as jellies, pickles, paint, varnish, etc., will not be accepted unless in bottles or cans securely stoppered, nor powders unless so packed that they cannot escape in transmission or damage the mail.

4. Parcels shall not contain a letter, packet or parcel intended for delivery at an address other than that borne on the parcel itself.

5. It is also prohibited to send to the United Kingdom foreign reprints of British registered copyright works, false money, counterfeit, sterling and British silver coin below standard, tobacco stalks, clocks, watches and metals generally bearing imitations of British assay marks or stamps. The prohibitions as regards other countries are shewn in the Post Office Guide.

RE-DIRECTION.

6. Parcels re-directed from one Post Office to another in Cyprus shall be liable to additional postage at the full inland rate for each re-direction.

RESPONSIBILITY FOR LOSS OR DAMAGE.

7. The Island Postmaster shall not be liable to make good any claim arising out of the loss, damage or delay of parcels sent by post.

CUSTOM HOUSE DECLARATION.

8. The sender of each parcel for abroad will be required to fill up a Custom House Declaration Form. Upon this form must be given an accurate statement of the contents and value, date of posting, and the sender's signature and address.

CUSTOMS REGULATIONS.

9. Parcels on arrival here from Foreign Countries will be liable to examination by an Officer of Customs, who will assess the amount of Customs dues to be charged thereon. The Customs dues will be collected at the time of delivery, and no parcel can be delivered until the Customs and all other charges are paid.

10. Parcels found to contain forbidden articles and parcels, the contents and value of which have been falsely declared, may be dealt with according to the laws on the subject. And generally the senders of parcels, whether in Foreign Countries or Cyprus, will be required to conform to the Customs and other laws or regulations from time to time in force in respect of such parcels.

UNDELIVERED PARCELS.

11. A parcel which cannot be delivered will be retained at the Post Office to which it is addressed for a period not exceeding three months; but if possible the sender will be consulted through the Postal office of origin, as to its disposal.

12. Parcels which cannot be delivered, returned to the senders, or re-directed, and which have thus become undeliverable, will eventually be returned to the country of origin.

13. Parcels becoming offensive or injurious to any Officer of the Post Office or other person or to other parcels will be disposed of as the Island Postmaster may direct.

INSURANCE ON PARCELS.

1. If any article of pecuniary value enclosed in or forming part of an insured parcel be lost or damaged whilst in the custody of the Island Postmaster, the Island Postmaster may (subject to the approval of the High Commissioner) pay to any person or persons who may in the opinion of the Island Postmaster establish a reasonable claim to compensation, having regard to the value of the article, the care with which it was packed and other circumstances, such sum in respect of such parcel as he may think just.

The Island Postmaster is not liable either personally or in his official capacity to any action or other legal proceeding in respect of or in consequence of the loss or damage of articles enclosed in or forming part of any parcel. And, subject to the approval of the High Commissioner, the decision of the Island Postmaster on all questions arising between him and any person claiming payment in respect of the loss or damage of any article enclosed in or forming part of a parcel shall be final.

2. An amount not exceeding £12 may be paid by way of compensation for the loss or damage of any parcel in respect of which the sender has paid the sums hereinafter mentioned in addition to the postage payable thereon.

3. In respect of every additional payment of the sums hereinafter mentioned which may be paid as aforesaid compensation to an additional amount of £12 may be paid: provided that the amount of compensation payable in respect of any one parcel shall in no case exceed the limit of insurance hereinafter mentioned.

4. (a) Parcels containing watches, jewellery or any other articles of gold or silver cannot be sent by parcel post unless insured for at least part of their value.

(b) Parcels containing coin cannot be accepted for transmission by parcel post even if insured.

(c) Any parcel posted uninsured and found to contain any of the above named articles will be returned to the sender by the Island Postmaster or his deputies.

(d) A compulsory registration fee of 4cp. will be collected on the delivery of every uninsured parcel received from other administrations and found to contain any of the above named articles.

COLLECTION OF TRADE CHARGES ON POSTAL PARCELS.

REMBOURSEMENT SYSTEM.

1. The "Remboursement" system is designed to meet the requirements of persons who wish to pay for articles sent to them at the time of receipt of the articles and also to meet the requirements of traders and others who wish to recover through the agency of the Post Office the value of articles supplied by them.

2. Throughout these Regulations the amount to be collected under the "Remboursement" system is called the "Trade Charge."

3. The amount of Trade Charge shall not exceed the limits accepted by the country of destination and the maximum shall in no case exceed £40 including the fees payable at the Office of Origin and Postage.

4. Every "Remboursement Parcel" posted or delivered in Cyprus shall be chargeable with such special fees as may be prescribed for that purpose.

5. The fees payable at the office of origin will be collected at the time of posting; and should be included by the sender in the amount required to be collected from the addressee. The full amount so collected is remitted to the sender of the parcel by means of Trade Charge Money Orders.

6. Remboursement parcels are to be accepted at every District Post Office in Cyprus and at Troödos and Platres during the seasons.

7. If a Remboursement parcel is not claimed by the addressee within a period of 15 days, after notice shall have been sent to the addressee, exclusive of the day of such notice being sent, it will be treated as undeliverable.
