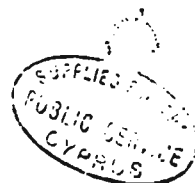

IMPORT DUTY. TABLE OF EXEMPTIONS.

- i.—All goods imported for the Government of Cyprus to be used in the public service and duly certified as so imported by the Chief Secretary to Government. Law No. 22 of 1899.
- ii.—All Military Stores imported by His Majesty's War Department and duly certified as such by the Officer to whom they are consigned.
- iii.—All articles of Military equipment imported by and for the use of any Officer of His Majesty's land forces.
- iv.—Goods and Stores of every description supplied under contract with His Majesty's War Department for the public use of His Majesty's land forces, duly certified as such by the principal Commissariat Officer, such certificate to be countersigned by the Chief Secretary to Government.
- v.—Uniforms of Public Officers and professional robes of Legal or Judicial Officers in the employment of His Majesty's Government, provided that such uniforms or robes are introduced for the personal use only of such officers, and have been duly authorised.

(a) An additional duty of 4½p. per oke, or fraction of an oke, is charged if imported through the Parcels Post.

(b) If otherwise imported there is an additional duty of 1s. per oke, or fraction of an oke, when in packages of less than 20 okes.

- vi.—Professional robes of Advocates entitled to practise in Cyprus.
- vii.—Authorised uniforms of Foreign Consuls and Consular Officers and national flags imported for their use.
Authorised uniforms of any Foreign Government to be worn by persons entitled to wear them Government medals and decorations to be worn by persons resident in Cyprus.
- viii.—Fire-arms for the personal use of Officers of His Majesty's Naval and Military Forces.
- ix.—Paving stones imported by Municipal Councils in the Island to be used for the paving of streets within the Municipal limits, and duly certified as so imported by the President and Cashier of any Municipal Council.
- x.—Street lamps and their fittings imported by Municipal Councils in the Island to be used in the lighting of Streets within the Municipal limits, and duly certified as so imported by the President and the Cashier of any Municipal Council.
- xi.—Casks and vats, and staves and hoops for use in constructing casks and vats.
- xii.—Microscopes and all microscopical and other apparatus or appliances for purposes of scientific investigation and research.
- xiii.—Gymnastic apparatus, mathematical and generally all other instruments used in schools for educational purposes, which are imported for the use of schools.

The High Commissioner may in certain cases order admission free of duty of goods sent for use in Consular Offices (Sec. 11 of Law XXII. of 1899).

Dutiable articles and articles sent away for the purpose of alteration or repair provided: (1) that prior to exportation such articles shall have been produced to the Customs for the purpose of identification on re-importation, (2) or that the Chief Collector of Customs is satisfied that the articles are the same, (3) and that the re-importation takes place within one year from the date of exportation.

Disinfectants imported in bulk (*i.e.*, packages each weighing not less than 10 okes or in drums each not less than five gallons) admitted duty free.

All manure and fertilisers, guano, bonedust, and all chemical manures and preparations to be used as manure.

Resin—free of import duty.

Motor cars, parts of motor cars, their fittings and gearing—free of import duty until 1st November, 1917.

Baggage—the *bona fide* baggage accompanying a passenger or following by vessel within two months shall be exempt from duty.

Crude Petroleum—when imported as Fuel for oil engines.

The fees paid shall not be less in any case than 10s. and the party paying the same shall have no right or claim to any refund in the event of any of the services, for which the fee has been paid, not being rendered. Such enquiries will ordinarily be made by the permanent Enquiry Clerk in due course; but, in special and urgent cases, a special officer may be employed on payment of such extra charge as the Registrar General may determine. Where the summons requires only the production of documents, or the giving of evidence based on records in the office, the charge of 3s. shall be levied if the service can be rendered by an officer in the District Office. If it involves the bringing in of an officer from the District or another part of the Island, a sum in addition to the 3s. shall be taken, sufficient to cover his travelling expenses so far as they can be calculated. In every case the payment will be regarded as final and will be brought to account at once, no refund being made under any circumstance.

RATES OF POSTAGE—continued.

AUTHORITY.

PRINTED PAPERS, COMMERCIAL PAPERS AND SAMPLES.

No packet of newspapers, commercial papers or printed papers must exceed 5lbs. in weight, and the weight of a packet of patterns is limited to 12 ozs. The size of a packet of patterns is limited to 12 inches in length, 8 inches in width, and 4 inches in depth.

If only partly prepaid they will be chargeable on delivery with double the deficiency of postage; if unpaid they will be stopped.

The articles which are entitled to be sent at the rate applicable to Printed Papers are mostly impressions or copies obtained upon paper, parchment, or cardboard, by means of printing, lithography, engraving, photography, or any other mechanical process easy to recognise.

This description includes the undermentioned articles wholly printed:—Newspapers, books (stitched or bound), periodical works, pamphlets, sheets of music, visiting cards, address cards, proofs of printing, plans, maps, catalogues, prospectuses, announcements, circulars, notices, engravings, photographs, and designs.

Besides these articles, there are some others which, though not printed matter, are admitted, as, for instance, manuscript intended for the press (when sent with the relative proof), papers impressed for the use of the blind, albums containing photographs, and cardboard drawing models stamped in relief.

Anything, not being of glass, usually attached or belonging to any of the before-mentioned articles, in the way of binding, mounting, or otherwise, and anything convenient for their safe transmission by post, may also pass at the rate applicable to such articles, provided it is contained in the same packet.

Proofs of printing or of music may bear corrections with a pen and may have manuscript annexed to them; circulars, etc., may bear the signature of the sender, his trade or profession, place of residence and a date. A book or Christmas and New Year's cards may have a dedication or complimentary inscription in manuscript and printed or lithographed stock or share lists, prices current and market reports may have the prices added in writing. Compliments not to exceed five words may be written on visiting cards sent at the Book rate of Postage. Mechanical reproductions (not less than 20) of a manuscript or type-written original may pass as printed papers if handed over the Post Office Counter. Albums containing photographs, and paper or books impressed for the use of the blind may pass as printed papers.

Commercial Papers comprise all papers or documents written or drawn wholly or partly by hand (except letters or communications in the nature of letters, or other papers or documents having the character of an actual and personal correspondence), documents of legal procedure, Deeds drawn up by public functionaries, copies of or extracts from Deeds under private seal written on stamped or unstamped paper, Way Bills, Bills of Lading, Invoices, Receipts for goods or money and other documents of a mercantile character, documents of Insurance and other public Companies, all kinds of Manuscript Music, the Manuscript of Books and other literary works, letters and post-cards of old date which have already served their original purpose, and pupils' exercises either in original or with corrections, but without any comment on the work and other papers of a similar description.

Printed Papers and Commercial Papers must be posted either without a cover or in an unfastened envelope, or in a cover which can be easily removed for the purpose of examination without breaking any seal, or tearing any paper, or separating any adhering surfaces. A packet posted without a cover may not be fastened or otherwise treated so as to prevent easy examination. It may, however, be secured with string. If closed against inspection it will be surcharged at double deficiency at the letter rate of postage. If there is any mixture of commercial and other papers in the same packet the whole is treated as commercial papers.

In order to secure the return of packets which cannot be delivered the names and addresses of the senders should be printed or written outside.

The undermentioned articles are excluded from transmission at the rate applicable to printed papers:—

Postage stamps, whether obliterated or not, and in general all printed articles constituting the sign of a monetary value.

The use of the Sample Post is restricted to (a) *bona-fide* Trade Samples or Patterns of Merchandise without saleable value, and (b) natural history specimens, dried or preserved animals and plants, geological specimens, and scientific specimens generally, keys, fresh flowers, tubes of serum and pathological specimens rendered innocuous by their mode of preparation and packing, when sent for no commercial purpose. Packets containing goods for sale or consigned in execution of an order (however small the quantity), or articles sent by one private individual to another which are not actually trade samples or patterns or scientific specimens, etc., cannot be forwarded by Sample Post.

It is recommended that every sample should be marked "Sample—not for sale" or otherwise defaced in such a way as to render the article unsaleable in the ordinary way of trading.

Addresses of letters, etc., must be plainly written and consist of the full names of the addressees, their profession, trade, business, name of quarter, street and number of house, whenever possible, together with the place of destination written at the bottom of the addresses.

Letters, etc., for villages must bear the name of the District and nearest Post-Town or Rural Post Office and in cases where there are two or more villages of the same name, such as Vassa, Prastio, Kouklia, Ayios Theodoros, Calo chorio, Peristerona, etc., special care should be exercised in giving proper postal addresses.

Subject to certain exceptions, the Island Postmaster possesses, by virtue of the Statute Law of Cyprus No. 6 of 1881, the exclusive privilege of carrying letters from place to place, and of performing all incidental services such as those of collecting and delivering letters.

The principal exceptions are—

Letters sent by private friend, on his journey, to be delivered to the person to whom they are directed.

Letters sent by the servant of the sender or by a special messenger employed by him.

Letters concerning goods sent by carrier, such letters being carried gratuitously and delivered with the goods to which they relate.

But no collection of letters of any kind (whether exempt from the Island Postmaster's privilege or not) can be made for the purpose of conveyance or delivery, and carriers are specially prohibited from carrying letters. Postage stamps must be affixed on the right hand upper corner of the address side of all Letters, Papers and Packets intended for transmission by Post. Penalties are imposed for any infringement of the Island Postmaster's rights.

GENERAL REGULATIONS.—DEFINITIONS.

1. The expression "Parcel" means any packet which is transmitted by the Post between certain places within the Island of Cyprus or to parts beyond the seas, and which bears the words "Parcel Post," or is otherwise marked for transmission as a parcel, or is prepaid in accordance with the rates of postage hereinafter mentioned, and is tendered for transmission as a parcel.

Notification No. 3 published in *Gazette* No. 185 of 19th December, 1895, as amended by Order of High Commissioner No. 429 of 22nd May, 1907, published in *Gazette* No. 889 of 14th June, 1907.

DIMENSIONS AND WEIGHT.

2. No parcel shall be conveyed by Parcel Post the dimensions of which shall exceed in length three feet six inches or exceed six feet in length and girth combined, or which shall exceed in weight eleven pounds.

PLACES FOR POSTING.

3. The places in the Island of Cyprus where Parcel Post business is transacted are Larnaca, Nicosia, Limassol, Famagusta, Paphos, Kyrenia, Polemidia Camp, the principal villages, and, during certain of the summer months, Troödos and Platres.

TIME AND MODE OF POSTING.

4. Parcels intended for transmission by Parcel Post will be accepted at any of the offices previously named during the hours the offices are open for the transaction of ordinary postal business. Parcels must not be posted in a Letter-Box, but must be taken into a Post Office and handed over the counter to the officer on duty thereat; and a parcel should not be left until the weight, size and postage have been tested by the clerk at the counter. If any such parcel shall be left at a Post Office without being so measured and weighed, and shall not bear the proper amount of postage stamps upon it, the parcel shall be detained, and may be given up to the senders thereof or otherwise disposed of as circumstances may require. Parcels posted in the letter box are treated as insufficiently prepaid letters.

5. Parcels intending to be despatched to places outside Cyprus must be posted in time to reach the office where the Parcel Mails are finally made up at least one clear day before the steamer sails.

ADDRESS.

6. Parcels should be plainly directed and bear the words "Parcel Post" in the left-hand corner. In order to secure the return of parcels which cannot be delivered the names and addresses of the senders should be written outside.

PACKING.

7. Parcels must be securely and substantially packed by the sender. Parcels properly packed to all external appearance are, however, only conveyed at the sender's risk. Parcels addressed to villages must be sealed.

SPECIFICATION OF TAXES, DUTIES. &C.

PARCEL POST—*continued*.

FORBIDDEN, PERISHABLE, AND DANGEROUS ARTICLES.

8. It shall be prohibited to forward parcels which bear on the outside any writing or drawing of an indecent or offensive nature or within which any contents of a like nature may be observed, and parcels containing gunpowder, cartridges, oil-skins or other similar oiled goods, oiled paper, lucifer matches, or anything explosive or liable to sudden combustion, bladders containing liquid, live animals, live or dead insects except live bees enclosed in special receptacles, grossly offensive or filthy matter, and anything in a condition likely to injure other parcels or any Officer of the Post Office.

AUTHORITY.

9. Parcels containing fish, game, meat, fresh fruit, sweetmeats, eggs, etc., or razors, scissors, needles, knives, forks, or other sharp instruments will not be accepted unless securely packed so as to guard against risk or injury to other parcels. Liquids or semi-liquids, such as jellies, pickles, paint, varnish, etc., will not be accepted unless in bottles or cans securely stoppered, nor powders unless so packed that they cannot escape in transmission or damage the mail.

10. Parcels shall not contain a letter, packet or parcel intended for delivery at an address other than that borne on the parcel itself.

11. It is also prohibited to send to the United Kingdom foreign reprints of British registered copyright works, false money, counterfeit, sterling and British silver coin below standard, tobacco stalks, clocks, watches and metals generally bearing imitations of British assay marks or stamps. The prohibitions as regards other countries are shewn in the Post Office Guide.

RE-DIRECTION.

12. Parcels re-directed from one Post Office to another in Cyprus shall be liable to additional postage at the full inland rate for each re-direction. Persons desiring parcels to be re-directed will be required to fill up a special form for the purpose, or state clearly by letter that they wish this to be done, otherwise the parcels will not be forwarded.

PROVISION FOR SAFETY OF PARCELS.

13. In any case where it may be found necessary or expedient for the safety or protection of parcels that any parcel should be forwarded by some later despatch than that for which it was posted, the parcel may be delayed to the next subsequent despatch. In exceptional cases, for instance, during storms in winter, the delay may be longer.

PARCELS NOT TO INTERFERE WITH LETTER POST.

14. When the despatch from a Post Office of letters would be delayed by the despatch of parcels at the same time, such parcels or any of them may be detained until the next subsequent despatch, but not later, except as in the last preceding paragraph.

15. In no case will Parcel Mails arriving from abroad be dealt with until after the ordinary Mails have been despatched.

RESPONSIBILITY FOR LOSS OR DAMAGE.

16. The Island Postmaster shall not be liable to make good any claim arising out of the loss, damage or delay of parcels sent by post.

17. In all cases the parcels must be fully prepaid by means of postage stamps affixed to the address side of the parcel, otherwise they will not be accepted for transmission.

DEMURRAGE ON LOCAL PARCELS.

18. Local parcels remaining uncalled for at the places to which they are addressed shall be liable, after six days' detention, to a demurrage charge of 1cp. per day. No local parcel will be detained at a Post Office for a period exceeding one month.

UNDELIVERED PARCELS.

19. If a parcel which cannot be delivered bears on the cover the name and address of the sender, a printed notice shall be sent to him by post informing him that the parcel (if not claimed in the meantime by the addressee) will be given up to him or to any person whom he may direct to call for it, or will be returned to him by post.

20. If the sender elects to have the parcel sent back to him by post he must return the printed notice with stamps sufficient to cover new postage at the full rate, together with any other charges to which the parcel may be liable, including that for demurrage described above. The parcel shall then be forwarded to him fully prepaid by stamps affixed thereon.

21. If no reply is received in ten days the parcel shall be forwarded to the Returned Letter Office, Nicosia, for disposal in due course.

22. Any parcel which cannot be delivered from any cause shall be detained one month at the place to which it is addressed, and then forwarded to the Returned Letter Office. All such parcels received in the Returned Letter Office, shall be opened and examined, and if upon such examination the name and address of the sender are ascertained a printed notice such as is described above shall be sent to him, and the parcel treated in the same manner as a parcel upon the cover of which the name and address of the sender appears.

23. The names and addresses upon all undelivered and unreturnable parcels and the Post Offices at which they were posted shall be entered on a list which will be exhibited in a conspicuous position at all Post Offices for inspection by the public.

24. Personal application for parcels entered on such lists will be entertained for three months from the date of entry, after which the parcels shall be disposed of as the Island Postmaster may think proper.

25. Parcels containing perishable articles shall be dealt with from time to time as the Island Postmaster may direct.

AUTHORITY.

CUSTOM HOUSE DECLARATION.

26. The sender of each parcel for abroad will be required to fill up a Custom House Declaration Form, which may be obtained at any Office where Parcel Post business is conducted. Upon this form must be given an accurate statement of the contents and value, date of posting, and the sender's signature and address. The number of declarations required are shewn in the Parcel rates below.

DEMURRAGE ON FOREIGN PARCELS.

27. Parcels from Foreign Countries, if undeliverable, will be retained at a Post Office for remaining uncalled for at the places to which they are addressed shall be liable after a 10 days' detention from the date of arrival at the office of destination to a demurrage charge of 1cp. per day. No foreign parcel will be detained at a Post Office for a period exceeding three months.

CUSTOMS REGULATIONS.

28. Parcels on arrival here from Foreign Countries will be liable to examination by an Officer of Customs, who will assess the amount of Customs dues to be charged thereon. The Customs dues will be collected at the time of delivery, and no parcel can be delivered until the Customs and all other charges are paid.

29. Parcels found to contain forbidden articles and parcels, the contents and value of which have been falsely declared, may be dealt with according to the laws on the subject. And generally the senders of parcels, whether in Foreign Countries or Cyprus, will be required to conform to the Customs and other laws or regulations from time to time in force in respect of such parcels.

UNDELIVERED PARCELS.

30. A parcel which cannot be delivered will be retained at the Post Office to which it is addressed for a period not exceeding three months; but if possible the sender will be consulted through the Postal office of origin, as to its disposal.

31. Parcels which cannot be delivered, returned to the senders, or re-directed, and which have thus become undeliverable, will eventually be returned to the country of origin.

32. Parcels becoming offensive or injurious to any Officer of the Post Office or other person or to other parcels will be disposed of as the Island Postmaster may direct.

AUTHORITY.

Private boxes can be rented at the Post Offices Nicosia, Larnaca, Limassol, Famagusta, Kyrenia, Paphos and Platres, at the undermentioned rates:—

The above payments must be made in advance and no person will be allowed the use of a box until he has first paid therefor in accordance with the above scale.

2. A key with a number label will be supplied to each renter of a box on his depositing with the Clerk in Charge the sum of 4s. which will be returned if the renter, on ceasing to rent his box, gives back his key and number label. The renter will be responsible for the safe custody of the key and label.

In the event of a key being lost another key will be supplied to the renter on his depositing a further sum of 4s. which will be returned if the lost key is given back to the Clerk in Charge within one month from the date when the new key was supplied. If the lost key is not given back within this period the deposit will become forfeit.

3. The Island Postmaster, if he thinks proper, may refuse to allot a box to an applicant without assigning any reasons for so doing, or may withdraw the privilege of renting a box by giving to the renter a month's notice of his intention to do so. Any balance of rent which may be due to the renter at the expiration of such period shall be refunded.

4. Articles and packets of a bulky nature which the private boxes will not contain will be delivered from the parcel window during the General Delivery, notification of such articles being placed in the Private Boxes. Registered letters and unpaid articles will be delivered during the General Delivery at the public counter and Registered Letter Wicket. No letters or packets will be placed in any Private Box unless they are addressed to the person or firm renting the same. No two persons can jointly rent one Private Box.

5. Renters and their messengers are expressly forbidden to ask questions from the officers engaged in sorting correspondence into the Private Boxes.

6. Renters should advise their correspondents as far as possible, to insert the No. of their Private Boxes in the body of the address.

7. The Post Office takes no responsibility for any delay to correspondence occasioned by the use of Private Boxes.

8. Power is reserved to modify or add to these Regulations from time to time as occasion may require.

RE-DIRECTION.

Applications for correspondence to be re-directed must in all cases be duly signed by the persons to whom the letters, etc., are to be addressed and be forwarded to the Post Office at which the re-directions are desired to be made. Printed forms for the purpose may be obtained at all Post Offices.

INSURANCE OF FOREIGN REGISTERED LETTERS OF VALUE.

1. As all the routes available for ordinary letters are not available for insured letters, the latter may be longer in transit than the former.

2. Insured letters will have all the safeguards of the registration system: and, subject to the following regulations, compensation will be paid if they or any of their contents are lost in the Post.

3. Postcards or packets of "Printed Papers" or "Commercial Papers" or Sample Packets cannot be insured. The letters to which the insurance system is specially applicable are those which contain bank notes, bonds, coupons, securities, etc.

4. Letters intended for insurance must be presented at the counters at the above named Post Offices and must not be dropped into the letter boxes or handed to Mail Messengers or Mail Coach Drivers.

5. Insured letters may not contain coin, anything made of gold or silver, precious stones, jewellery or any article liable to Customs duty in the country of destination.

6. Insured letters must not be addressed to initials or in pencil.

7. Every letter packet tendered for insurance must be enclosed in a strong cover, which must be securely fastened and sealed with fine wax in such a way that it cannot be opened without either breaking the seals or leaving obvious traces of violation. Envelopes with black or coloured borders must not be used. Seals must be placed over each flap or seam of the cover of a packet: and if the packet is tied round with string or tape, a seal must be placed on the ends where they are tied.

8. All the seals on a letter must be of the same kind of wax, and must bear distinct impressions of the same private device. Coins must not be used for sealing: and the device must not consist merely of straight, crossed, or curved lines which could readily be imitated.

9. If a letter tendered for insurance does not, in the opinion of the officer of the Post Office to whom it is tendered, fulfil the foregoing conditions as to packing and sealing, it is his duty to refuse to insure it. Nevertheless the onus of properly enclosing and sealing the letter lies upon the sender; and the Post Office assumes no liability for loss arising from defects of the cover or the seals which may not be observed at the time of posting.

10. The amount for which a letter is insured (which must not exceed its actual value) must be written by the sender both in words and in figures at the top of the address side of the cover, thus:—"Insured for fifteen pounds (£15), 375 francs." No alteration or erasure of the inscription is allowed. If a mistake is made, the entry must be completely obliterated and an entirely new one made by the sender.

11. The insurance fee in addition to the full postage and registration fee must be prepaid by means of postage stamps which the sender must affix to the cover of the letter.

12. As few stamps as possible should be used to prepay the postage and insurance fee. They must not be folded over the edge of the cover, and when more stamps than one are used, they must be affixed with spaces between them.

13. A certificate of posting must always be obtained by the sender of an insured letter. He may also obtain an acknowledgment of the delivery of the letter under the same conditions as those applicable to registered letters on prepayment of 2cp.

14. Letters which, although addressed to a country or place to which the insurance system does not extend, have been irregularly insured, will be forwarded as registered letters: and if they or their contents are lost in the Post, the regulations as to the compensation payable in the case of registered letters will be applicable.

15. When an insured letter is redirected from one country to another, a fresh insurance fee becomes payable for each such transmission. If this fee is not prepaid, it is collected from the addressee on delivery. Insured letters can only be redirected to countries which have adopted the insurance system.

16. Compensation not exceeding the insured value will be granted to the sender, or, at his request, to the addressee of an insured letter, for any actual loss or damage to the letter while in postal custody. The sender of a lost insured letter is also entitled to a return of the postage paid, but in no case is the insurance fee refunded.

Compensation will not be paid at all for any such letter containing any prohibited article or for any letter which has been delivered against receipt with the seals unbroken and has been accepted without remark by the addressee or his authorized agent nor does it follow as a matter of course that compensation will be given when loss arises from tempest, shipwreck, earthquake, war or other causes beyond control.

It shall also be withheld when it appears to the Postal Administration—

(a) That the loss or damage has been caused by the fault or negligence of the sender or arises from the nature of the article.

(b) That there has been fraud on the part of the sender, or where

(c) The addressee does not apply for compensation within 12 months from the date of posting and it shall also be withheld.

(d) On any ground on which a common carrier might in like case claim exemption from legal liability.

17. The final decision upon all questions of compensation rests with the Postal Administration of the country in which the loss has taken place.

18. Any insurance effected with the Post Office contrary to the foregoing regulations is invalid.

INSURANCE ON PARCELS.

AUTHORITY.

1. If any article of pecuniary value enclosed in or forming part of an insured parcel be lost or damaged whilst in the custody of the Island Postmaster, the Island Postmaster may (subject to the approval of the High Commissioner) pay to any person or persons who may in the opinion of the Island Postmaster establish a reasonable claim to compensation, having regard to the value of the article, the care with which it was packed and other circumstances, such sum in respect of such parcel as he may think just.

The Island Postmaster is not liable either personally or in his official capacity to any action or other legal proceeding in respect of or in consequence of the loss or damage of articles enclosed in or forming part of any parcel. And, subject to the approval of the High Commissioner, the decision of the Island Postmaster on all questions arising between him and any person claiming payment in respect of the loss or damage of any article enclosed in or forming part of a parcel shall be final.

2. An amount not exceeding £12 may be paid by way of compensation for the loss or damage of any parcel in respect of which the sender has paid the sums hereinafter mentioned in addition to the postage payable thereon.

3. In respect of every additional payment of the sums hereinafter mentioned which may be paid as aforesaid compensation to an additional amount of £12 may be paid; provided that the amount of compensation payable in respect of any one parcel shall in no case exceed the limit of insurance hereinafter mentioned.

4. (a) Parcels containing watches, jewellery or any other articles of gold or silver cannot be sent by parcel post unless insured for at least part of their value.

(b) Parcels containing coin cannot be accepted for transmission by parcel post even if insured.

(c) Any parcel posted uninsured and found to contain any of the above named articles will be returned to the sender by the Island Postmaster or his deputies.

(d) A compulsory registration fee of 4cp. will be collected on the delivery of every uninsured parcel received from the places hereinafter mentioned and found to contain any of the above named articles.

AUTHORITY.

(For the delivery of Parcels, in the United Kingdom and Egypt free of any charges, arranged to be paid by the sender :—)

Fee payable per parcel - - - - - 4½cp.

Note.—There is also an Express Delivery System for letters and other Postal packets but the fee is payable by the addressee on the delivery of the letter or other Postal packet.

COLLECTION OF TRADE CHARGES ON POSTAL PACKETS.

1. The "Cash on Delivery" system is designed to meet the requirements of persons who wish to pay for articles sent to them at the time of receipt of the articles and also to meet the requirements of traders and others who wish to recover through the agency of the Post Office the value of articles supplied by them.

2. Throughout these Regulations the amount to be collected under the "Cash on Delivery" system is called the "Trade Charge."

3. The amount of Trade Charge shall not exceed the limits accepted by the country of destination and the maximum shall in no case exceed £20 including the fees payable to the Office of Destination and Postage.

4. Every Cash on Delivery parcel or packet posted or delivered in Cyprus shall be chargeable with such special fees as may be prescribed for that purpose.

5. The fee due to the Office of Origin shall be paid at the time of posting. The fee due to the Office of Delivery shall be deducted, with the Commission on the Money or Postal Order from the amount of the Trade Charge collected from the addressee of a Cash on Delivery parcel or packet and shall be forwarded direct from the Office of Delivery to the sender. These deductions are to be provided for by the sender and included in the amount desired to be collected.

6. Cash on Delivery parcels or packets are to be accepted at every District Post Office in Cyprus and at Troódos and Platres on the following conditions :—

The sender shall—

(a) write on the cover of the parcel or packet his name and full address, the amount in British currency of the Trade Charge in figures and words, and the name of the Office on which the Money Order or Postal Order is to be drawn. These particulars may be written on the back of the parcel or packet if there is no room for them to be written clearly on the front. No erasure or alteration of the entry of the amount shall be allowed. An incorrect entry shall be completely obliterated and a fresh entry made ;

(b) fill up a Request Form obtainable at all District Post Offices and the Post Offices at Troódos and Platres which includes a declaration that the Cash on Delivery parcel or packet is sent in fulfilment of an order (if the sender desires to correct the entry of the Trade Charge he shall fill up a fresh form) ;

(c) prepay in addition to the ordinary postage and other charges, the Cash on Delivery fee provided for that purpose by affixing to the Request Form a postage stamp or stamps denoting the amount of such fee.

The sender shall then hand in the parcel or packet at the counter, where he shall be supplied with a certificate of posting which he shall give up when he presents the Money or Postal Order to be cashed.

7. Where a Cash on Delivery parcel or packet has been insured, the amount of the insurance shall not exceed the amount of the Trade Charge, and in the event of loss the amount of indemnity shall be governed, without regard to the amount of the Trade Charge, by the ordinary rules relating to parcels, insured letters or registered packets.

8. The amount of the Trade Charge shall not exceed the amount of the Declared Value together with the postage and the fees payable on the parcel or packet in connection with the Cash on Delivery system.

9. Any conversion of money that may be necessary shall be effected at the Office of Destination.

10. Where the sender of a Cash on Delivery parcel or packet wishes to reduce or cancel the Trade Charges on a parcel or packet, he shall fill up a special form to be obtained at all District Post Offices and affix thereto a postage stamp or stamps denoting the amount of the fee prescribed for that purpose.

11. Where a Cash on Delivery parcel or packet—(1) has been irregularly accepted for a country to which the system of Cash on Delivery does not extend ; or (2) bears a Trade Charge which exceeds the maximum prescribed in the country of destination ; or (3) lacks some essential particulars, it may be returned to the sender.

12. If a Cash on Delivery parcel or packet is not claimed by the Addressee within a period of 15 days, exclusive of the day of arrival, it will be treated as undeliverable.

PUBLIC DEBT.

PUBLIC DEBT.

Under an Annex to the Convention of 4th June, 1878, between Great Britain and Turkey the former Power has undertaken to pay to the Porte annually a sum representing the excess of Revenue over Expenditure calculated on the average of the five years preceding the date of the Convention, excluding the produce of State and Crown lands let or sold during that period. The amount to be paid has been determined to be £87,686 per annum; this to be in addition to 4,166,220 okes of Salt to be paid in kind.

The sum of £113 11s. 3d. per annum has also become payable, under the same Annex, since the 4th September, 1884, when the Cyprus Government took over the administration of the Lighthouse Service in the Island. This sum represents 22% of the receipts of the Ottoman Lighthouse Administration which the Sublime Porte enjoyed under the concession granted the Company for lighting the Coast of Cyprus.

By a further Agreement of 3rd February, 1879, a further sum of £5,000 is to be paid annually to the Porte in respect of the produce of State lands.

A sum of £60,000 provided for by a loan has been expended on Irrigation, and £2,400 by way of Interest and Sinking Fund is provided in the annual Estimates. On 31st March, 1916, £50,701 was outstanding.

Further loans to the amount of £254,000 were obtained on account of the Famagusta Harbour and Railway, and £9,272 by way of Interest and Sinking Fund was provided in the annual Estimates, of which sum £9,271 was expended, as a further sum of £2,500 was contributed from the Locust Fund as its share of debt charges. On 31st March, 1916, £200,800 was outstanding.

The Maronites are under the authority of an Archbishop residing in Syria ; the Roman Catholics and Armenian Catholics under the Latin Patriarch of Jerusalem.

The Sisters of the French Order of St. Joseph of the Apparition have a Convent, School, and dispensary at Larnaca, and Convents and Schools at Nicosia and at Limassol.

The Friars of the Franciscan Order have a Convent two Churches and a School at Larnaca, and Convent with Schools attached at Nicosia and Limassol. They depend on the " Custodia " of Terra Santa.

The Maronites have eight Churches and four Monasteries in the Island.

The Armenians have a Church, Surp Asdvadzadzin. at Nicosia, and a Monastery, Surp Magar, and Chapel in the Kyrenia District.

There are three Anglican Churches, those of St. Paul at Nicosia, St. Helen at Larnaca, and one at Limassol. There are dedicated Church Rooms at Famagusta, Kyrenia, and Troödos.

Taking an average of the number of prisoners employed on public works and valuing their labour at 4½cp. per man per diem for stone-breaking and 6cp. for other work, the value of the services of the convicts during the year may be put at £2,214 3s. 4cp. The estimated value of the labour of prisoners employed on industrial work (shoe-making, tailoring, weaving, dyeing, carpentering, brush-making, stocking-making, and baking) is £2,385 0s. 6cp.

The amount derived from the sale of broken stone to Municipalities, etc., and paid into the Treasury was £7 18s. 6cp.

3,820 cubic yards of broken stone were supplied to the Public Works Department for which no payment was received.

In winter 10 hours, in summer 8 hours. Sleep is in association in the District Prisons. The passages, corridors, and wards are well lighted. They are constantly patrolled during the night, and are visited frequently and at uncertain hours by the Governor of the Prison.

Each prisoner sleeps in a separate cell in the Central Prison.

One warder is stationed in each corridor or (in the Central Prison) Block.

There are no Chaplains attached to the prisons. Priests of all denominations are admitted at the request of the prisoners.

In the District Prisons no religious services are held, except at Paphos and Larnaca for Greek-Christians. The Greek-Christians confess and receive the sacrament on their chief religious festivals. In the Central Prison a service for Moslems is held on Fridays and on alternate Sundays a priest or layman attends and ministers to the members of the Greek Church. The attendance of the hodja has been regular and that of the priest and layman has been less frequent this year, viz.: on 6 occasions. A religious and general instructor (in addition to the priest or layman) appointed from 6th May, 1906, for Greek; also for Moslem. Attendance of Moslem and Greek teachers to school classes and for religious instruction has been regular.

Access is allowed to priests of all denominations. They are not apprised when prisoners are admitted, but notice would be given if prisoners expressed a wish to see them.

In Central Prison 3 classes of one hour each are held weekly ; in District Prisons there are no schools, but well-conducted prisoners who can read are allowed to have religious books of their respective persuasions.

Prisoners of good behaviour and industrious in labour sentenced to not less than two years are, if males, after three-fourths, or, if females, after two-thirds of their term of imprisonment has expired, recommended to the High Commissioner for remission of their sentence, with, or without, Ticket of Leave.

The District Medical Officer certifies as to the cause of death. Yes. Inquest held by the Commissioner of Nicosia (Coroner) on convict No. 327 Halil Hj. Moustafa who died at the Nicosia General Hospital on 6th January, 1916.
