## CYPRUS"

Mr. Hantilton Lang is ono of thóse rare Englishmen who inhaoited Cyprus published several articles in various published several articles in various newspapers on our Island and not resting work on the same subject Ihough he quitied the Island many years ago, he still takes an interest in our welfare and at present we wish to briefly refer to an article which he
has lately inserted in the "Jimos" on
the suljectet of the Enctish aduinist tion in Cyprus wilh refurcuce that Blue Book and the report contaned therein cmanating fremorr contanined trators.

Mr. Lang states wilh satisfiction ihat the taxes are collected regulaly; ho also siates that with the increase in their salaries, the local judgers have become inpartial and expeditive; Le finds that Municipal institutions are taking rapid root in the country, ard that the authorities do all in their power for the furtherance of same, though ho cannot give more thatn oue single instance where this was done viz. at Li massol. He however finds that this bright picturo has one flatw viz. the excessive cost caused to the country by the present administration, which ia the time of the Turks did not amonat to more than $£ 29,000$ while now it amounts to about $\begin{aligned} & \\ & 70,000 . \\ & \text {. } \mathrm{He} \text { is of }\end{aligned}$ opinion that this system of administration is too costly and aristoczatic, things that the only true and ef$f \in c t u a l$ method that could be adopted is that of curtailing the expenses and not that of increasing the taxes. He winds up by hoping that the question of expenses will be better examined when the administration of the Island is transferred to the Colonial Office.
We lave thought proper to give our readers this brief summary in order that they may be better able to recognize the fact how easi'y it is to be deceived, when judging a conntry from a distance. We have already at various times expressed an opinion as to the necessity of introducing reforms in the present organisation of forms in the present organisation of
the and, and before all in tho personnel, as well in the judicial régime, which, notwithstanding all that Mr'. Lang states are absolutely the same as under the T'urkish rule.
As to what he states with respect to our Municipal institutions we can confidently say, without fear of being contradicted by any one, that at no time has the spirit of efntralisation been so dominant among our rulers as at present. It may even bo said that the new administration has sought ritther to destroy the little "Self Gorernment" that remained to the Island through her many vicissitudes and misfortunes. The proof of this is that wo are atpresent without any recognized muvicipal law properly accepted by the coantry, and villages such as Rizocurpas and Lefcara, the largest in the Island, cannot obtaiu permission to form a regular municiyal body.
If the new administration however, were to apply themselves to the proper amelioration of the Island which they have taken under their charge and for the guardenslip of which they are responsible, we would consider the ques. tion of expense as a secondary matter, as we are convinced that Cyprus well governed, well caltivated, well explored, would be able to supports all experse that circumstances may demand for the purpose of having active and capable administraters who would be able to procure for the Tsland the pregress, that the richnes of its soil, the iutelligence and capabilities of the inhabitants, would certainly cause them to bring ubout very easily, with small efforts and in a short space of time,

sary. The term of tine in which he was to do sary. The tern of time in which he was to do this was limited by the contract to eighty days, commencing tiom 24th March last. Tho sum he was to receive in consideration was fixed at two hundred Napolcons, and if at the end of the time speciffed the work was not finished he was to pay two

Messers. Zachariades' advocate, on behalf of his clients, asked, the ultimate result of the action not being for the moment at issue, that an expert should be named by the Cour to examine into the questions: (1)whether th various clauses of the contract had been fulfiled; (2) to ascertain whether half of the work did not yetremain undonc; in this latter event to have the work in arrears. properly carried out and completed under his own superinten dence at the cost of, and with responem lity attaching to, defendant; the judgement tion or appcal, so far as the survey is con cerned.
The gentleman appearing for Alliano informed the Court that not yet having been nbie to settle matters regarding the pecuniary arrangemoats between himsect and dosendant, he was compelled to ask for an adjournment until some understanding could sumptive client.
